REPORT OF ACTIVITIES 2008-2010

This document is the final report of the activities undertaken by the Committee on Culture during the mandate 2008-2010. The Committee was constituted by the World Congress of Jeju (October 2007). This document follows the guidelines provided by the World Secretariat, as conclusions of the Executive Bureau of Chicago (26-27 April 2010), communicated by the Secretary General of UCLG to the president of the Committee on 1 June 2010

Summary

The Committee on Culture has reached almost all the objectives of the **programme 2008-2010**.

Culture has definitely become an important element in **international governance**. Local governments play a strong role in the cultural dimension of international governance. The voice of local governments is well articulated, partly thanks to the impact of Agenda 21 for culture and the involvement of UCLG.

The Committee has become **a hub of information and expertise** on the relation between cultural policies and local development.

The Committee on culture aspires to have a renewed mandate.

In the future, the activities on culture within UCLG should not be restricted solely to the Committee on culture. A leap of legitimacy is needed, and some **institutional innovation** within UCLG (World Secretariat and sections) is required to meet the challenges.

A. Presentation

This chapter briefly presents the context of UCLG's Committee on Culture, and its Programme 2008-2010

1. Background

The **Agenda 21 for culture** is the first worldwide document establishing an undertaking by cities and local governments for cultural development. 409 cities, local governments and organisations from all over the world were linked to Agenda 21 for culture on 1 September 2010.

United Cities and Local Governments – UCLG adopted Agenda 21 for culture as its reference document in October 2004 (Executive Bureau of Sao Paulo), constituted its Working Group on Culture in June 2005 (World Council of Beijing) which was succeeded by the Committee on culture in October 2007 (World Congress of Jeju), upgrading the consideration of culture within the World organisation.

2. Why a Committee on culture was created?

Intergovernmental organisations have promoted culture as one of the emerging areas of international governance. UNESCO Convention on Cultural Diversity (2005), the Alliance of Civilisations (2006), the European Agenda for culture (2007)... Approved in 2004, Agenda 21 for culture has become the main (original and multilateral) contribution of cities to global cultural governance. The Committee on culture was created to convey the messages of cities and local governments on global cultural issues. Advocacy, lobby and policy development.

Local policies for development are usually based on the triangle of sustainability: economic growth, social inclusion, environmental balance. Today, this triangle is judged as old. Culture is seen as the fourth pillar of sustainable development at a local level. Local cultural policies, based on the intrinsic values of culture (creativity, critical knowledge, diversity, memory, rituality...) are becoming more important for democracy and citizenship. The Committee on culture was created to allow cities to exchange experiences and improve mutual learning. Networking and project development.

The Committee on culture has become a **unique meeting point**. There is not another structure at a global level that gathers together cities, organisations and networks that foster the relation between local cultural policies and sustainable development.

3. The programme of the Committee on culture for 2008-2010

The **programme** had 1 main aim, 5 objectives and 31 actions.

- Main aim. To promote the role of culture as a central dimension of local policies, fostering the relation between culture and sustainable development and the processes of intercultural dialogue, through the international dissemination and local implementation of Agenda 21 for culture
- Objectives. (1) Governance. (2) Development of projects. (3) Policy development. (4)
 Development of alliances and partnerships. (5) Resources.

B. Detailed explanation of progress

This chapter presents in detail the activities undertaken to implement the 31 actions listed in the Programme 2008-2010 of the Committee on culture

1. **Governance.** A committee with active members with shared responsibilities and very dynamic within UCLG.

We have recalled cities and local governments on the list of "observers" to consider becoming "official members". We believe it is important that the membership keeps a category of "observers" which is a transitional category for cities and local governments, and also a suitable way to facilitate the exchanges with international organizations, networks and civil society.

2. **Development of projects**. UCLG and its Committee on culture are locally, nationally and internationally well-known, and develop specific projects in the field of exchanging experiences and good practices on the local implementation of Agenda 21 for culture.

2.3. To reinforce the external visibility of Agenda 21 for culture	The new website, as well as bulletins and newsletters have contributed to a better visibility.

Circulars are sent (World Secretariat) to official members, and immediately forwarded (Secretariat of the Committee) to observers and other stakeholders. 4. **Development of alliances and partnerships**. Networking and advocacy that establish the basis of shared projects, allowing cities an active presence in the international debates on culture and sustainable development.

The Committee has been involved in the process "Towards a new framework for cultural policies", convened by the Division on Cultural Policies and Intercultural Dialogue.

5.2. To establish sponsorship agreements with private corporations	 Preliminary contacts have been established, but substantial progress has not yet been achieved.

C. Main achievements

This chapter summarizes the activities undertaken by the Committee on Culture during the period 2008-2010. It follows the "List of recommended review criteria, adopted by the Executive Bureau on 26-27 April 2010 in Chicago.

1. Progress

- a. *Implementation of the Work Plan.* The Work Plan 2007-2010 has been implemented. The Committee on Culture has reached almost all the objectives of the programme 2008-2010. See details above, in chapter "B" of this document.
- b. Impact: Policy contributions and technical tools. The Secretariat of the Committee has coordinated the implementation of the programme with the World Secretariat. (i) A Policy Statement has been just launched, aligned with the priorities of the world organization. (ii) The Secretariat of the Committee on culture offers detailed advice to all cities wishing to implement locally the Agenda 21 for culture. (iii) Agenda 21 for culture itself (2004) and the 2 complementary documents (2006) are "toolkits" for local cultural development.
- c. Activities in the field. A peer-review scheme was organized. Four reports were published. Four seminars were organized. A Fund on International Cultural Cooperation (AECID-UCLG-Barcelona) was launched. Partnerships with UNESCO, European Union, Council of Europe and international networks on culture and development.

2. Structure

- a. Membership. The Committee has an active political involvement.
- b. Regional representation. The Committee has members in almost all regional sections of UCLG, although a better balance is needed, and will be seeked with the secretaries of sections.
- c. Coordination with Committees and Regional sections. The Secretariat of the Committee has coordinated the implementation of the programme 2008-2010 with relevant committees and with regional sections.

3. Operations: Communication and Lobbying

- a. Communication and dissemination. A new website was launched and is periodically updated. 25 circulars and 11 bulletins were sent. 8 new translations of Agenda 21 for culture.
- b. Lobbying / advocacy. UCLG's Committee on Culture is a unique meeting point: there is not another structure at a global level that gathers together cities, organizations and networks that foster the relation between local cultural policies and sustainable development. It largely contributes to the visibility of UCLG.
